This course develops a basic understanding of the history of major world cultures. It imparts a general chronology of world history and an overview of world geography. It also examines important themes and trends that affect more than one world civilization. The course provides a crucial overview of cultures and meetings between cultures that accelerating movement toward an ever more integrated globe requires.

Upon completion of the World Civilizations course, students will:

- 1) Know a general chronology of world history, including key events and cultural achievements from different parts of the globe.
- 2) Understand the basics of world geography and how geographic conditions and events have helped shape history.
- 3) Report on key political states and / or leaders who changed the world's history.
- 4) Analyze similar trends across cultures.
- 5) Compare and contrast past with current events, issues and problems.
